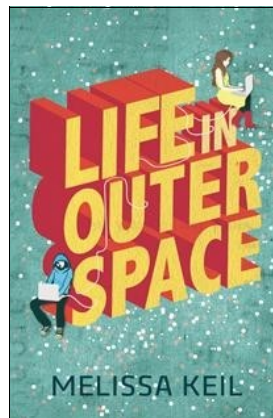

He has his horror movies, his nerdy friends, World of Warcraft - and until Princess Leia turns up in his bedroom, worry about girls he won't. Then Camilla Carter arrives on the scene. She's beautiful, friendly and completely irrelevant to his plan. Sam is determined to ignore her, except that Camilla has a plan of her own - and he seems to be a part of it! Sam believes that everything he needs to know he can learn from the movies. But perhaps he's been watching the wrong ones.

When she convinces Rose to be part of the annual Harvest Parade, Rose must find a special dress for the occasion. She seeks the help of the eccentric Edie Baker, who knows all the town's secrets and whose own family has a rich tapestry of stories. When Rose agrees to let Edie teach her to sew, she doesn't realise that nothing will ever be the same again.

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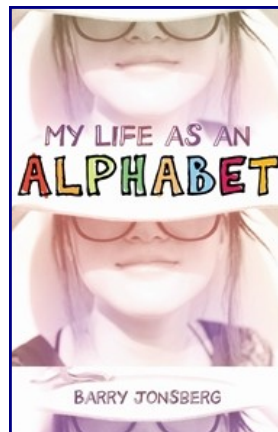

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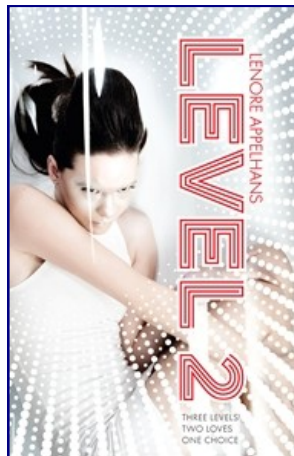

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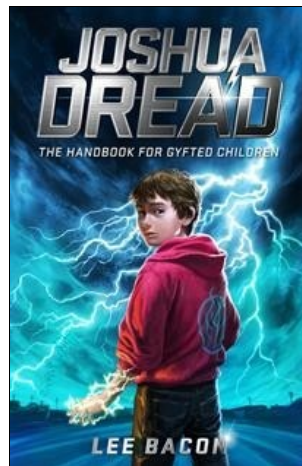
Joshua Dread: The Handbook for Gyfted Children

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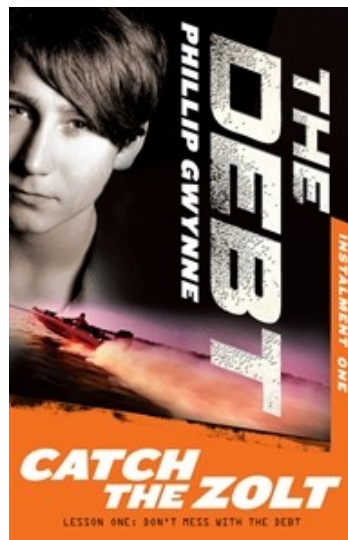

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Big Thursday

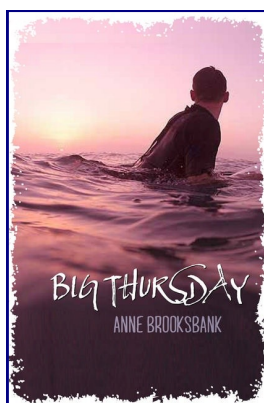

A moving family drama about change and loss, and having the courage and strength to surf the big breaks. By the acclaimed author of *Father's Day* and *Mother's Day*.

His dad had often spoken of these rare and special days: the days when some change far out in the sea brought great waves rearing up and crashing in a tumult of white water against the land. The last one was called Big Monday.

Nat loves the surf – a love he shares with his dad, a former surfing champion. But his dad's business has collapsed, meaning that his family will lose the house near the lake and surf beach. Nat finds that life is unpredictable and, like the waves, you have to ride what comes as best you can.

Will Nat be able to hold his family together? He doesn't have much time. Will another huge surf on Big Thursday make or break him? *Publishers Blurb.*



This is a story of one family's struggle when change is forced upon them. Nat and his dad share a special love of the surf and Nat quickly realises that life is as unpredictable as the surf.

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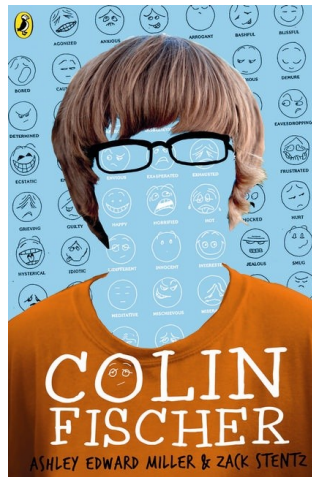
Colin Fischer

Colin Fischer doesn't like to be touched. Or the colour blue. He avoids eye contact unless *absolutely necessary*. Sherlock Holmes has a place of honour on his wall. His room is a shrine to clear-headed logic. When a phone rings loudly in class, Colin can't cope. *So he barks like a dog*. But when a gun goes off in the school cafeteria he isn't scared. He's curious . . . Colin Fischer is determined to discover who fired that gun. *Publishers Blurb*.



Colin keeps a notebook to record everything, doesn't like loud noises or the colour blue and avoids all contact, including eye contact.

He is fascinated by facts and uncovering the truth, hence Sherlock Holmes is his idol.

When a gun goes off in the school canteen he is not afraid, only curious and intent on finding out who is responsible.

The book contains explanations and questions regarding different theories, such as behavioural and mathematical theories, and footnotes providing additional information at the bottom of many pages. I found these amusing and enlightening, as I am sure some of your students will, but others may simply skim over them as an unnecessary addition to the actual story.

The story itself is excellent and engrossing, and draws the reader into wanting the best outcome for the unlikely hero. It will open many discussions about Asperger's Syndrome and many other conditions that require understanding and empathy by all in society.

A fantastic read that is best suited to lower to middle secondary students.
