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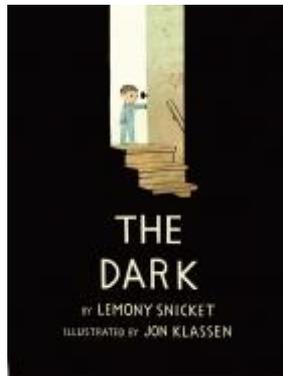

Themes:

- Overcoming Fear
- The Dark

Discussion Points:

- Do you sometimes feel like Laszlo did about 'the dark'?
- What is it about 'the dark' that people are often afraid of?
- There might be other things that worry you, not just 'the dark'. As a class, come up with a list of things that are part of our everyday life that we might be afraid of. Can you think up some ways that you can overcome these fears?
- How did Laszlo overcome his fear? What characteristics did he show when confronting 'the dark'?
- Did that fact he talked to 'the dark' help? Explain.
- 'Without a cupboard, you would have nowhere to put your shoes, and without a shower curtain, you would splash water all over the bathroom, and without the dark, everything would be light, and you would never know if you needed a lightbulb.' Do you think this sort of reasoning could help you overcome your fears? ie: everything is there for a purpose, you just have to think differently about things. Explore this idea as a class group.
- How can confronting a fear allow us to overcome it?

Activities:

- Create a list of other things that wouldn't happen without something else being there, like the ones in the story, ie; without a creaky roof, the rain would fall on your head. See how many you can think of.
