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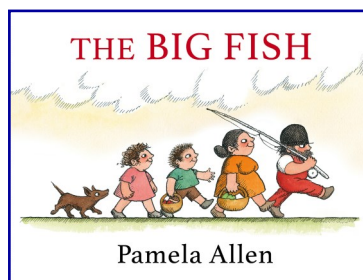
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Once upon a time

Themes:

- Fishing
- Family

Discussion Points:

- The family were all going fishing. Is this something that you like to do? If so, where do you fish and what sort of fish do you catch?
- Why do you think people like to fish? List 5 things that are good about fishing.
- Do you think he was actually close to catching a fish? What clues are there?
- What was the song that the old man sang?
- The little old man found himself in trouble. Can you recall in what order the rest of the family came to help him?
- Have you ever been in a position when you have had to help someone in difficulty or someone has had to help you? Is it a natural reaction to want to help others? Discuss.
- How do you think the dog knew that the family needed help?
- How else do animals help people in the community and in the workplace? What characteristics do these animals have? What animal is the most common in these situations?

Activities:

- Find some real life examples of animals helping and rescuing humans.
- As a class, make your own giant fish. Use a variety of materials, especially for the scales. Also make a large sign of the old man's song, 'I wish, I wish, Oh, how I wish I could catch a big fish!'
